WWF Manager of Pollinator Conservation and Communications, Wildlife of the Americas
January 17–22, 2027

Join us in Mexico to experience one of the most astounding natural events on Earth, featuring an unlikely creature: the delicate monarch butterfly.

Every year, at the end of the summer, millions of monarchs take flight on a remarkable 3,000-mile journey, from the Northeast United States and Southeast Canada to their ancestral wintering grounds in the volcanic mountains of central Mexico. Travel with WWF experts to central Mexico's Monarch Butterfly Biosphere Reserve for a



unique chance to get up close to these amazing creatures. Immerse yourself in the monarchs' fascinating world and learn directly from WWF experts and local communities about our work with the Mexican government, local communities, and partners to protect monarch hibernation grounds and to support sustainable projects that provide an economic alternative to the people who live in the monarch region of Mexico.

ITINERARY IN DETAIL

Day 1, January 17: Mexico City, Mexico

Our monarch butterfly tour begins on arrival in Mexico City, with a transfer from the airport to our downtown hotel in the upscale Polanco district. Gather this evening for a welcome dinner with representatives from WWF-Mexico followed by an orientation to the wonders that lie ahead. One of the world's most astounding natural events occurs each year in North America, featuring one of its most unlikely creatures: the delicate monarch butterfly. Every autumn, tens of millions of monarchs set flight on a remarkable 3,000-mile journey from the Northeastern US and Southeastern Canada to their ancestral wintering grounds in the volcanic mountains of central Mexico. The location of their breeding grounds remained a mystery until 1977, and how an infant generation of butterflies finds it anew each year is still an enigma. Filled with anticipation, we look forward to tomorrow's journey into the mysterious kingdom of the monarchs.

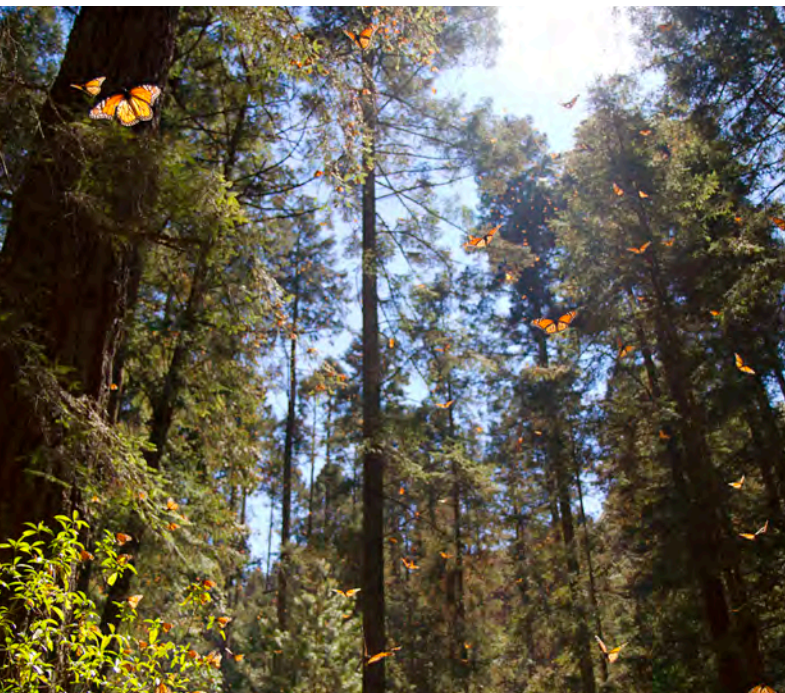
Overnight Grand Fiesta Americana Hotel (D)

Day 2, January 18: Angangueo—El Rosario Butterfly Sanctuary

Leaving Mexico City, we drive into the Central Highlands past vistas of the snowcapped Nevado de Toluca volcano, bound for the small mountain town of Angangueo. Once a copper and silver mining town, Angangueo today thrives on butterfly tourism and local agriculture. The village is very picturesque, a tumble of pastel buildings set along narrow

cobblestone streets that hug the steep mountain slopes. Enjoy a hearty lunch of homemade Mexican fare before making our first foray into the monarch kingdom at El Rosario Butterfly Sanctuary, one of 12 sanctuaries that comprise the Monarch Butterfly Biosphere Reserve.

As we drive high into the hills in an open-topped truck, a few butterflies flit about, offering a hint of what awaits ahead. Riding small Mexican horses provided by the local community (and led by your own caballero, so no horse experience is necessary), we ascend the trail through the forest as hummingbirds and red warblers accompany us to



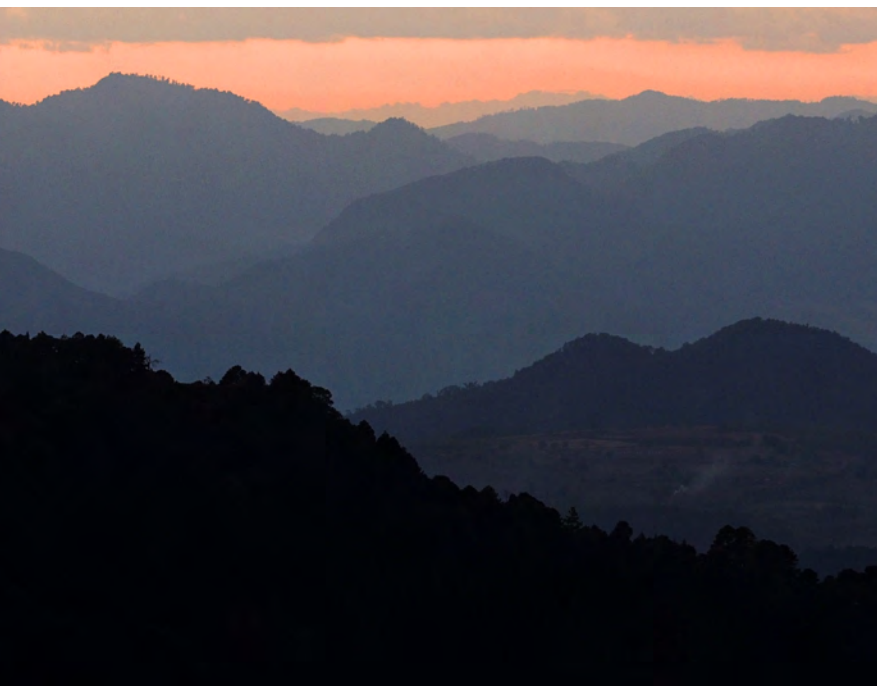
the heart of the monarchs' migration site. What we find is an almost surreal sight. At first glance, they look like autumn leaves, but we soon realize we are looking at millions of butterflies, covering the oyamel fir trees in a delicate, quivering blanket of black and orange. Boughs bend beneath their numbers, though each monarch weighs less than half an ounce. Massed together in a colony, they cling to the trees in huge clusters to survive the cool winter temperatures. When the sun warms their parchment-thin wings, the monarchs take to the sky in a fluttering cloud of orange—so many that the air hums with their movement. Mexico's sanctuaries are the only place in the world where you can actually hear butterflies' wings beating. Their beauty is so ethereal that many Mexicans still hold the Aztec belief that the souls of the dead are reborn as monarchs.

Day 3, January 19: Angangueo—Chincua Sanctuary

At Chincua Butterfly Sanctuary, another magical encounter with the monarchs awaits. Riding horses along the established trail most of the way, we hike the last bit to reach the butterflies. Sometimes the stream along the forest floor appears to flow orange, covered



completely by butterflies as they descend to drink. As Mexican butterfly conservationist Carlos Gottfried said, "When you stand in a monarch sanctuary, your soul is shaken, and your life is changed." During our visit, we hear about efforts to preserve this fragile forest ecosystem which is key to the monarchs' survival, and learn about what WWF–Mexico is doing in conjunction with local communities to protect the butterflies' habitat. Our visit is one way to assist, demonstrating to the local people that ecotourism can be a

more viable and sustainable source of economic sustenance than logging. Later this afternoon, there's time to discover more of the village of Angangueo, known for its magnificent murals celebrating the importance of monarchs to the community.

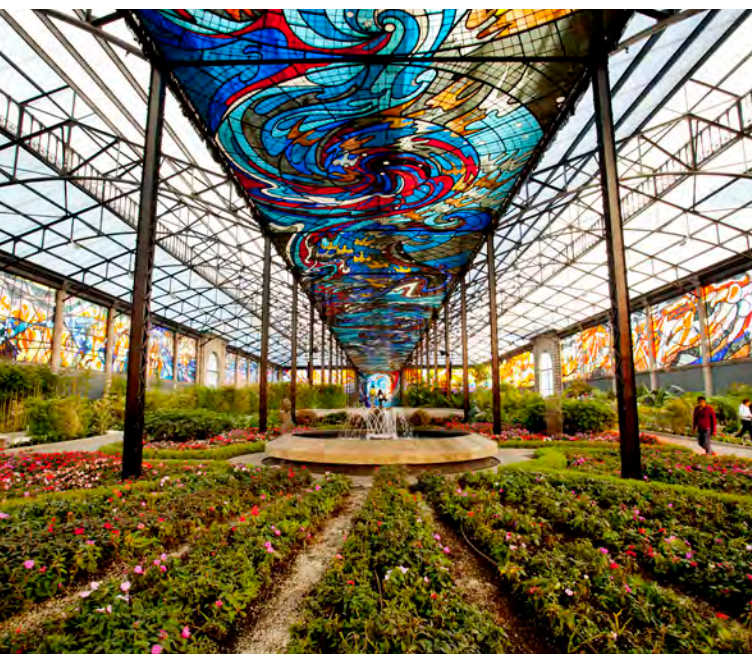
Day 4, January 20: Angangueo—El Rosario Sanctuary / Jungapeo

This morning, partners from WWF-Mexico's Monarch Butterfly Program will join us for our morning excursion to the El Rosario Monarch Butterfly Reserve, where they have worked for some 20 years. The largest of the monarch sanctuaries in the region—and a World heritage Site, El Rosario spans 138,379 acres and offers an unparalleled opportunity to view great numbers of monarchs in one location. Observe the butterflies' fascinating winter behavior as they hang onto large fir trees and learn how WWF surveys Mexico's annual butterfly population by tagging and counting the monarchs.



While at El Rosario, we'll take a behind-the-scenes look at their reforestation efforts and walk through their oyamel fir tree farm, where thousands of saplings grow. In addition to other tree nurseries in the area, WWF has helped plant over 13 million trees in an area heavily impacted by illegal deforestation activities. While WWF forest engineers help with the work of growing trees, the program also creates a number of local jobs. After lunch, we travel to Jungapeo to reach our ecolodge and spa, tucked into the mountains of Michoacan. Renowned for its mineral hot springs and soaking pools, our hotel's lush grounds are home to myriad species of tropical birds. Spend the afternoon soaking it all in. Dip in the legendary springs, or scout for birds across the verdant grounds. Hike to a nearby waterfall, book a spa treatment, or simply relax.

Overnight Hotel Agua Blanca (B, L, D)



Day 5, January 21: Jungapeo / Toluca / Mexico City

Awaken to a symphony of tropical bird-song emanating from surrounding trees and bushes as we enjoy a peaceful morning at our eco-resort. After lunch, we begin our return journey to Mexico City, stopping en route in Toluca, originally a 13th-century Indigenous settlement, to visit Cosmovitral Botanical Garden. The building's interior, which houses 500 plant species from Mexico and around the world, glows with the ethereal light of stained-glass panels created by Tolucan



artist Leopoldo Flores. Say farewell over a classic Mexican feast before returning to the capital this evening for a late check-in at our hotel.

Grand Fiesta Americana Hotel (B, L, D)

Day 6, January 22: Mexico City / Depart

After breakfast on the final day, our monarch butterfly tour concludes with a transfer to the airport for flights home.

Meet Our Expert



Clay Bolt, WWF Manager of Pollinator Conservation and Communications, Wildlife of the Americas

As the Manager of Pollinator Conservation for WWF-US, he focuses on working with communities to support healthy populations of North American pollinators, including monarch butterflies, native bees, and other species. WWF does this by restoring habitat, offering education, and working to reduce our dependence on neonicotinoids and other ubiquitous pesticides. Additionally, Clay is an award-winning Natural History and Conservation Photographer specializing in native bees and many of the world's other smaller creatures. His photog-

raphy appears in publications such as National Geographic Magazine, The New York Times, and National Wildlife Magazine. This will be Clay's second time to Mexico's Monarch Butterfly Biosphere Reserve with WWF.

What to Expect and Physical Requirements

Visiting the butterfly sanctuaries requires walking approximately 3 to 4 miles round-trip through the forest, altitudes up to 11,500 feet. Because the location of the butterflies within the sanctuaries changes throughout the season and from year to year, exact hiking distances on each departure can vary. At times, the terrain can be rough and rocky, and we may have to traverse uneven ground and step over or around sticks and branches. Uneven, steep inclines may require us to maintain balance as we watch the butterflies. The effects of altitude should not be underestimated. While we rate this trip "moderate," the physical exertion involved can be considered strenuous for people who are less active.

The entrance to El Rosario Butterfly Sanctuary can only be accessed via a 30-minute, open-bed truck ride over cobblestone roads, which can make for a somewhat bumpy ride and may be considered uncomfortable for travelers with back or neck issues. Once inside the sanctuaries, horses are available to ride uphill to reach the butterfly colonies, but not down. When riding the horses, we will be led by a local guide through trails that can, at times, be narrow and rugged, so riders must be alert and maintain balance. Travelers should expect to spend 30-45 minutes on horseback at a time. Due to the diminutive stature of the local horses, the maximum rider weight each horse can carry is 260 pounds.

It is important to note that even with the option to ride horses, there will still be some hiking involved while going up to the colonies, as the horses cannot travel the entire length of the trail.

After dismounting, travelers will be required to walk a final 1/4 to 1/2 mile up a gentle slope to reach the butterfly colonies. Anyone who opts not to ride horses will have an approximately 3-mile uphill hike with significant elevation gain. All travelers must hike downhill back to the sanctuary entrance, descending at least 600 stairs over approximately 3 miles, with an elevation change of about 1,000 feet.

Please note: Monarchs cluster for warmth on endemic oyamel fir trees—a rare and beautiful sight to see. They don't fly unless the air reaches a certain temperature, so on cold, rainy, windy, or overcast days, we may not see the monarchs take flight.

Accommodations



Grand Fiesta Americana Hotel

Fully renovated in 2020, the four-star Grand Fiesta Americana Chapultepec is one of Mexico City's finest hotels. Enjoying an ideal location facing the Bosque de Chapultepec, one of the largest city parks in the Western Hemisphere, it offers the best of both worlds: proximity to the buzz of cosmopolitan Mexico City and a verdant nature sanctuary just out the door. The hotel is conveniently located just 7 miles from Benito Juárez International Airport (a quick 15-minute drive), near the Auditorio Nacional and famed Paseo de la Reforma. Most of the rooms in this high-rise tower offer panoramic views, including the adjacent Castle of Chapultepec. Standard amenities in spacious 366-square-foot rooms include air conditioning, complimentary Wi-Fi, plush bedding and linens, deluxe robes, a refrigerator, stocked mini bar, and a flat-screen TV with cable.



Hotel La Margarita or similar

La Margarita is a simple local hotel located near the center of the small historic mining town of Anguango. While its amenities are modest, rooms are clean and colorful and provide a base steeped in local atmosphere for our nearby butterfly activities. Spacious rooms have en suite bathrooms, free Wi-Fi, and cable TV. Like all accommodations in this remote mountain village, the hotel is not heated. However, rooms have wood-burning fireplaces, which take the evening chill off while adding rustic ambience. Extra blankets are also available. We base our butterfly trips in Anguango for the special local atmosphere, the town's involvement in monarch conservation, and its close access to El Rosario Butterfly Sanctuary.



Hotel Agua Blanca

Tucked into the lush mountains of Michoacan, Hotel Agua Blanca is a secluded eco-resort renowned for its legendary mineral hot springs, stunning natural beauty, and restaurant serving organic, traditional Mexican cuisine. A lively river runs through the property's 75 acres, and guests can explore the verdant forests, colorful gardens, and aromatic bushes—all home to a panoply of tropical birds—on a network of trails.

With just 21 guest rooms, Hotel Agua Blanca offers an intimate experience. Simple rooms are quaint and comfortable, with white walls and exposed wooden beams. Colorful painted accents brighten the dark wooden furniture, and beds are dressed in crisp linens and vibrant blankets. Some rooms have two double beds while others one king, and all have views of the gardens. En suite bathrooms feature solar-heated hot water, stand-alone showers, and refillable toiletries (no hair dryers). Although rooms do not have televisions—the owners prefer to keep the focus on nature, Wi-Fi and cell service are available throughout the hotel.

CANCELLATIONS & REFUNDS: Cancellations must be received in writing at Natural Habitat Adventures by US mail, email, or fax. At the time Natural Habitat Adventures receives your written cancellation, the following per person penalties apply: On or before 120 days before the trip: Full refund minus \$100. On or before 60 days before the trip: Forfeit 50% of tour cost. After 60 days before the trip: 100% of tour cost.

INSURANCE: Since the areas we travel to on this trip are remote and wild (that’s why we go there!), we require medical evacuation insurance for our guests’ safety. If you decline the medical evacuation insurance coverage offered by Natural Habitat, we request that you send us documentation of the independent coverage you have selected. We will add the cost of a medical evacuation policy to your tour invoice until you provide our office with proof of coverage, including your insurance company’s name, contact number, and your individual policy number. Thank you for understanding that our policy exists exclusively in the interest of our guests’ safety.

To protect your investment and to provide peace of mind while you travel, we also strongly recommend purchasing comprehensive travel insurance. Plans may cover everything from medical treatment to trip cancellations, delays, and lost luggage.
